REFLECTION

THE PASSOVER STORY – THE QUESTIONS

Why do we eat unleavened bread tonight?

We eat unleavened bread to remember that when our ancestors left Egypt they could not wait for the breads to rise so they took with them a flat bread called matzoh.

Why do we eat bitter herbs on Passover night?

We eat bitter herbs to remind us of how bitter life is for people caught in slavery.

How is this meal different from all other meals?

Tonight we celebrate freedom. We are grateful for God's mighty acts: splitting the Red Sea for us, sustaining us in the wilderness, giving us the Ten Commandments, and bringing us to Israel.
